

## Dollar Bill Rabbit, by Seth Friedman

Start with a U.S. Dollar bill -- that's about a 3x7 rectangle, if you don't have one on hand.



First precrease the base, starting with the center and the folds touching the corners. The half bird base at the tail should be easy; for the head section, fold perpendicular to the  $22.5^{\circ}$  bisector to get the dotted red reference line. The rest of the creases should be obvious enough from there.



There are no specific references for the pleats that form the body—it's a matter of personal taste. Likewise, the folds for the back legs and tail are also unreferenced. After folding both of these, you'll need to narrow the snout by folding the corners underneath; if you placed the pleats in the body right, you'll be able to tuck these corners underneath them. You'll also need to swivel all the pleats along the stomach to form the legs, and crimp the back legs to form feet.

Good luck folding!
